Words From the Bishop -Deepen Faith and Witness- Social Statement on Race and Culture

Note: This is the fifth in a series on the Social Statements adopted by the ELCA in Assembly. Previous reflections are available at www.montanasynod.org, archived.

In 1993, 5 years into the life of the ELCA, the Churchwide Assembly adopted a social statement "Freed in Christ: Race, Ethnicity and Culture." (You can find the full statement printed at www.elca.org/socialstatements .) When the church came into being we had the hope of becoming a far more multicultural church than we had been previously-we even had the goal of being 10% people of color or language other than English in the first decade of the church's life. It



did not happen. The social statement is hauntingly relevant today.

It begins with stating the 8 commitments the ELCA made at its beginning, including the 10% goal, representational principles, a Commission for Multicultural Ministry; ethnic interest groups, culturally specific new starts, advocacy and inclusivity across the church. It goes on to say: "The source of this many-faceted crisis, however, is profoundly spiritual. We will rise to the crisis, not by making a longer list of commitments, but by persisting with repentant hearts."

Addressing racism, the statement says: "Racism-a mix of power, privilege, and prejudice-is sin, a violation of God's intention for humanity. The resulting racial, ethnic, or cultural barriers deny the truth that all people are God's creatures and, therefore persons of dignity. Racism fractures and fragments both church and society." Addressing the church, the statement says:

"We expect our leadership to name the sin of racism and lead us in our repentance of it." And

"We expect our leadership to persevere in their challenge to us to be in mission and ministry in a multicultural society."

The statement goes on to describe ways for the church to do justice:

- + A time for public leadership
- + A time for public witness
- + A time for public deliberation
- + A time for advocacy

The statement suggests that racism is both a public and a private matter, both local and global, and urges the church to keep it at the top of our agenda.

In the 23 years since the statement was adopted some things have changed. But the underlying issues are still there, perhaps stronger than ever. High profile racially motivated violence has become a regular feature of our news. As a church we still struggle to respond.

A recent poll showed the ELCA to be the second least racially diverse church body in the United States. The challenge is there. Among the current ways that the ELCA is attempting to do justice is through the repudiation of the doctrine of discovery at the Churchwide Assembly, and standing with indigenous people seeking their rights. Another is the decision at the Churchwide too ask synods to provide regular anti-racism training. Presiding Bishop Eaton has hosted online conversations on race during the last year, and they are archived and available at www.elca.org. The Montana Synod will again start anti-racism training, with the expectation that it is as important for all leaders as boundaries training is.

"When we rebuild walls of hostility and live behind them-blaming others for the problem and looking to them for solutions-we ignore the role we ourselves play in the problem and also the solution. When we confront racism and move toward fairness and justice in society, all of us benefit."

"So the Church must cry out for justice, and thereby resist the cynicism fueled by visions that failed and dreams that died. The Church must insist on justice, and thereby refuse to blame victimized people for all their situations. The Church must insist on justice, and thereby assure participation of all people."

"We of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, with the whole Church, look forward to the time when people will come from east and west, north and south to eat in the reign of God. (Luke 13:29) For the Church catholic, diversity of cultures is both a given and a glimpse of the future."

May it be so.

Update on the Flood Damage to the Galilee Church and Children's Center in Cobija, Bolivia

A week and half ago a flood cause severe damage to the church an children's center in Cobija, a ministry of the Bolivian Evangelical Lutheran Church, our companion synod. The children's center ministers to at-risk children in this border city, where violence and drugs are rampant.



Dear Friends.

The first step of removing the damages has already been completed. The cost of the two walls that were totally destroyed will be \$10,000 and work has already been started to reconstruct them as their absence compromises the security of the property.

The church would be happy to accept gifts to defray this expense. The damage to the church was limited to the roof but they have been able to use it for worship.

Constitution Memorandum

RE: Amendments to the Model Constitution for Congregations of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.

Attached you will find the amendments to the Model Constitution for Congregations of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America which were adopted by the 2016 Churchwide Assembly. None of these amendments are automatically effective upon receipt of this memo. Each congregation will need to adopt these changes in accordance with C16.04. of these amendments (in their current constitutions the reference would be C17.04.). I would encourage congregations to work with the appropriate people in your synod as they prepare these amendments for action by the congregational meeting.

If the amendments are to bring the congregation's constitution into conformity with the Model Constitution, there only needs to be one vote with a majority of the voting members present to approve. The amendments go into effect when adopted and do not need synod approval. If there is a change to any of the Model Constitution proposals, then C16.01 is the appropriate provision to follow in amending the congregation's constitution.

The primary changes in the document relate to the merging of the three lay rosters into a roster of Ministers of Word and Service. These provisions should be added even if the congregation does not currently have under call a person on one of the lay rosters. Chapter 20. would also be important for those congregations that are part of a parish agreement.

Please share these proposed amendments with the congregations of the synod. This would be a good time to work with

congregations to ensure that amendments from earlier assemblies are also incorporated into their constitutions. It is very important that congregations have Chapter 15. Discipline of Members and Adjudication, that was adopted by the 2013 Churchwide Assembly, in their constitutions. We have had difficulties with congregations using the process that was there prior to 2013. By removing the synod council's authority to hear appeals that existed under the old process, we have had a couple of unresolved conflicts continue in congregations. This could be avoided by adopting the 2013 amendments.

It is always important to have the congregation's governing documents current. The best time to do this work is after a churchwide assembly. It is not helpful to wait until an amendment is needed in the life of a congregation to consider voting on the amendment. Prior preparation in adopting the rules that govern our life together is important and helpful work. Thank you for your work with the congregations of this church.


August Newsbrief: Luther and the Anabaptists

As a teenager, I lived in southeastern Pennsylvania, near Lancaster, and saw the Amish people in that area. At the time, I thought they were quaint people in old-fashioned clothes, driving with buggies and horses, and that they made really good food, especially jams, jellies, and pies. I thought they were just local to Pennsylvania and did not realize until years later that they also lived in other places in the U.S. And then I found out that the Amish were part of a larger movement, also springing out of Reformation times, called the Anabaptists. It wasn't until I came to the Montana Synod that I discovered that there was a colony of Hutterites in the area, also part of the Anabaptist movement. This month's newsbrief, "Reformation Neighbors: Lutherans, Hutterites, Mennonites, and Amish", by Paul Seastrand, covers the basic history of the Anabaptist movement, how they divided into different groups, what the characteristics of each group are, and where they settled in North America. I invite you to take a look at the August newsbrief and use it as an introduction to these different groups of people and what they believe. They are much, much more than just their cooking and their horses and buggies!

Updates on Seminaries

Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary, recently merged into California Lutheran University, has just announced that it will be moving to downtown Berkeley, closer to the rest of the Graduate Theological Union, and will be selling the property on the top of Marin.

Luther Seminary is selling some unused property to a medical center for expansion, and to an ecumenical organization building senior housing.

Lutheran Theological Seminary at Gettysburg and the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia are in the midst of conversation about merger.

Constitution Updates

The ELCA Churchwide Assembly has passed a number of constitutional changes that affect the Churchwide Constitution, the Synod Constitution, and congregational constitutions. Many of these changes are required, so all congregations will need to adopt them into their constitutions. One of the changes is to replace "ordained minister" with "minister of word and sacrament" wherever it occurs in the constitutions. Another change is to replace "Associate in

Ministry, Diaconal Minister and Deaconess" with "minister of word and service."

Our constitutional review team stands ready to assist you, and you can also go to www.elca.org to the Office of the Secretary. We are considering doing a workshop or webinar to assist congregations in reviewing their constitutions.

New Overtime Laws go into Effect in December

New Labor Department regulations may have a significant effect on churches who employ workers below a certain salary level. Employers (even non-profits) will need to pay overtime to employees who earn less than \$50,000 per year. We are in contact with the ELCA attorneys and our Synod attorney, and will be providing more information in the coming months.

ELCA Churchwide Assembly Key Actions



CHICAGO (Aug.16, 2016) - Voting members of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) approved a number of key actions during the 2016 ELCA Churchwide Assembly held in New Orleans Aug. 8-13. The assembly is the highest legislative authority of the church. The 945 voting members:

- Elected William B. Horne II of St. Paul's Lutheran Church, Clearwater, Fla., vice president of the ELCA. Horne was installed during closing worship Aug. 13.
- Accepted the "Declaration on the Way," a unique ecumenical document that marks a path toward greater unity between Catholics and Lutherans. At the heart of the document are 32 "Statements of Agreement" that state where Lutherans and Catholics do not have church-dividing differences on topics about church, ministry and the Eucharist. The document also presents the differences that remain.
- Approved AMMPARO the ELCA's strategy to Accompany Migrant Minors with Protection, Advocacy,
 Representation and Opportunities. The ELCA developed this strategy based on commitments to uphold and
 guarantee the basic human rights and safety of migrant children and their families; to address the root causes of
 migration in countries from Central America's Northern Triangle and Mexico and the treatment of migrants in
 transit; to work toward just and humane policies affecting migrants in and outside the U.S.; to engage as a
 church with all of its companions, affiliates and partners to respond to the migration situation and its causes; and
 to advocate for migrant children and their families.
- Approved the Ministry of Word and Service roster. Beginning Jan. 1, 2017, ELCA associates in ministry, deaconesses and diaconal ministers will be a single, unified roster of Ministry of Word and Service. The accompanying constitutional amendments related to the roster were also considered and approved by the assembly.
- Approved the 2017-2019 budget proposal. The budget includes a 2017 current fund spending authorization of \$65,296,005 and a 2017 ELCA World Hunger spending authorization of \$24.8 million; a 2018 current fund income proposal of \$64,057,220 and a 2018 ELCA World Hunger income proposal of \$25 million; a 2019 current fund income proposal of \$64,151,175 and a 2019 ELCA World Hunger income proposal of \$25 million; and authorizes the Church Council to establish a spending authorization after periodic review of revised income estimates.
- Approved various memorials or proposals from the ELCA's 65 synods. In addition to memorials considered
 "en bloc," the assembly separately approved the following: deepening relationships with historic Black
 churches; toward a responsible energy future; repudiation of the Doctrine of Discovery; peace with justice in the
 Holy Land; justice for the Holy Land through responsible investment; African Descent Lutherans; call to
 discernment on U.S. foreign and military policy; welcoming refugees; and supporting military personnel,
 veterans and their families.
- Elected members to serve on: Church Council, Portico Benefits Services, Mission Investment Fund, Augsburg Fortress, Committee on Appeals, Committee on Discipline and Nominating Committee.
- Adopted amendments to the ELCA Constitution, Bylaws and Continuing Resolutions.


Larry Mansch from Immanuel Lutheran in Missoula has a new book out now!
