Words From the Bishop - Deepen Faith and Witness-All Saints Matter



You only have to read the Gospel for All Saints to know that Jesus would never get elected to anything. He'd get banished as a crazy person, locked up for being a troublemaker. And that is exactly what did happen to him 2 millennia ago. He was locked up and sentenced to death as a troublemaker. Leymah Gbowee, a Liberian woman who spoke at the Churchwide Assembly said, "People say to me, 'Leymah, you must not be such a troublemaker' And I say to them, "I got a Nobel Peace Prize for being a troublemaker. You should try it, too.'"

Jesus was considered a troublemaker because he challenged the status quo. He challenged the cultural assumptions of the Roman Empire of his day, and his words continue to challenge us today. Particularly in this contentious election year, Jesus' words in the Gospel of Luke stand as a jarring contrast to the rhetoric that inundates us and tells us what to long for and what to fear. Jesus



would never get elected with a platform like the beatitudes, regardless of whether you go with this year's Luke, or the more familiar Matthew.

Focus groups have documented that people do not want to hear "Blessed are you who are poor" or "Blessed are you who are hungry now," or "Blessed are you when people hate you." And they certainly do not want to hear "Woe to you who are rich," or "Woe to you who are full now," or "Woe to you when all speak well of you."

And as for "Love your enemies," "bless those who curse you," "don't fight back against a person who hits you," "give to everyone who begs from you," this is not considered good policy. But it is the ethic that Jesus taught, the ethic that we affirm as Christians, even if it makes us uncomfortable.

It is the ethic, ultimately, that connects us with all the saints, those living and those who have died in the faith. On All Saints we remember the heroes and the martyrs, and we also remember our grandmothers and grandfathers, our mentors and teachers who helped us grow in the faith by their words and by their example. And we remember Christians across the globeour ecumenical full communion partners with whom we share ministry; our companion synods whom we accompany in ministry and service; Roman Catholics with whom we are exploring the meaning of the Reformation five centuries ago; Orthodox; Pentecostal; large denominations and individual congregations-we acknowledge that despite our differences in expression and emphasis, we are one in Christ.

On Monday of this last week an historic event took place. On the 499th anniversary of the reformation, Pope Francis joined Lutherans from around the globe at a spectacular service of worship, commemorating the Reformation. What a hopeful sign to cling to as we celebrate All Saints this year, and as we finish up this divisive election season. Next year, on October 30, I invite you to join the 2 Montana Catholic Bishops and me for our joint service of Christian Unity.

Such is the Kingdom of God

Syria in the Bible and in the Early Church: A Heritage at Risk

We hear about the war in Syria almost every day, but many of us don't know a lot about the history of this country and especially how it relates to the early church. Pr. Tom Lee, a retired pastor and Old Testament Scholar spent time on archeological sites in the middle east and for one summer in Syria. He agreed to sit down with Colter McCarty and record this class on the antiquities in Syria and what they can tell us about our history as Christians. Transitions Pilot Project: Ending Well

Calling all BBCR's (Baby Boomers Considering Retirement):

The Synod used to do Transitions Workshops through NRIT, and I had the good fortune of leading 3 of them with my husband Daniel. Following a successful pilot of the "Starting Strong" part of Transitions in a new format last spring, I am doing the same for those of you who are aiming at "Ending Well."

Using a group coaching and peer learning model, with some good research materials from the Alban Institute, I am offering a 4-session video conference pilot project for those of you who are planning to retire in the next year or two. While Portico leads us through the financial planning parts of retirement, there is so much more going on!

I had the good fortune of being coached all the way through my retirement planning, as I was receiving coach training from Auburn Seminary. It was helpful. Issues of timing, leave-taking tasks, boundaries, and celebrating are some of the meat and potatoes of "ending well." The wisdom and support of peers is an essential and valued part of the project.

We'll gather for 4 90-minute online sessions this fall, scheduled at the convenience of those who sign on. Group size is limited to 5. Two individual coaching sessions will be included as part of the pilot project. \$200 covers the group and individual sessions. CE funds can be used.


Intermountain Featured

From the Article:

"Daniel Champer, the director of school-based services for Intermountain in Helena, Mont., says the one word he'd use to describe the kids in his state is overexposed. Montana's kids may be in a big, sparsely populated state, but they are not isolated anymore. A suicide might happen on the other side of the state and the kids often know before the adults, says Champer. This makes it hard for counselors to help.

"And nearly 30% of the state's teens said they felt sad and hopeless almost every day for at least two weeks in a row, according to the 2015 Montana Youth Risk Behavior Survey. To address what they consider a cry for help from the state's teens, officials in Montana are working on expanding access to school-based and telebased counseling."

Perhaps it is still a little early to be thinking of Christmas... BUT, we want to make sure to get these materials into your hands well in advance so you can be prepared for Advent and a special resource provided to us by Intermountain's chaplain, Chris Haughee.

Have you ever seen an Advent devotional based on Chrismons? What's a Chrismon, you say?! A Chrismon is a type of symbol. Chrismons, or "Christ Monograms" are all hung on a tree, the Chrismon Tree. The tree itself is also a symbol for the Christmas season, a reminder of the truths we celebrate as we recall Jesus' birth. Many churches use the Chrismon Tree as a way of reminding their congregations about the truths celebrated this coming holiday season. They were first used as a way to celebrate Advent by Ascension Lutheran Church in Danville, Virginia!

Perhaps your congregation has a Chrismon Tree? It really is a wonderful way to celebrate Advent, and now it's a great way to connect with Intermountain's Residential Services and their chaplain, Chris Haughee, too.

Chaplain Chris has written an Advent devotional based on the Chrismon symbols, based on lessons he has used in chapel services at Intermountain. Intermountain would like to pass these on to the churches of the Montana Synod of the ELCA as a way of saying thank you for a wonderful year of mission together bringing healing through healthy relationships.

Montana Synod House Build

Thank you for your interest in partnering with the synod on this project. By utilizing volunteer labor, we will be able to save upwards of 15% of the building costs. With congregations from across the state participating it will truly be "our house!"

Here is what the project will look like;

We will be working with the ELCA Mission Builders. They have worked on a number of projects in our synod including Flathead Lutheran Bible Camp, Bethel Great Falls and Our Redeemers Helena. You can go to their elcamission builders.org to find out more about them.

We will be seeking crews to start on June 6th and expect to finish in early September.

Make up of crews

We will be looking for teams of 4 builders and 2 cooks to work each week. The build team will be working under the supervision of the Mission Builder manager and foreman. There will be four mission builders joining the project. The cook team will provide snacks for the crew. Note that safety is key on the jobsite so hardhats and the use of safety equipment will be required.

Work Week

The work week will begin on Tuesday and end on Saturday. Mission builders works from 7:30am - 4:30 pm. with a morning break and devotions, lunch at noon and an afternoon break.

Housing

It appears that it would be more cost effective for the volunteers to stay in hotels. RV's and campers could be utilized, the cost at KOA is \$65 per night. It would be great if the congregations of Great Falls could provide some housing for volunteers during the project.

Food

Each team member will contribute to the food kitty. There will be 4 breakfast and dinner meals, 5 lunches as well as morning and afternoon snacks. The last evening is usually a celebration night where the teams go out together. The suggested contribution is \$40. It would be helpful if once a week a congregation or congregation members could host a meal either in homes or at the church.

Equipment

When you have registered we will provide you with a list of items you might bring with you.

Expertise


Through all phases of the build we will be able to utilize the skill level of each member of your

November Newsbrief: Martin Luther's View of Creation

Our society today has paradoxical views of the devil. On the one hand, we think that we are rational creatures who can explain away any Biblical references to the devil or demon

possession by referring to them as a guilty conscience, or physical or mental illness that people in previous centuries did not know how to properly diagnose, and therefore blamed on the devil. On the other hand, we like to scare ourselves with horror movies, and there are legitimately some things that happen in life that we simply can't explain away rationally. In this month's newsbrief, Paul Seastrand takes a look at what Luther thought about the devil. Contrary to the idea of the devil in a red suit with horns and a tail, Luther thought of the devil as a real spiritual presence that worked to tear people away from the true Gospel by using such tools as doubt and temptation. If you've ever had doubts about the baptismal questions which ask us to renounce the devil and all his works and all his ways, then this newsbrief is for you.
