- h. Motion carried unanimously.

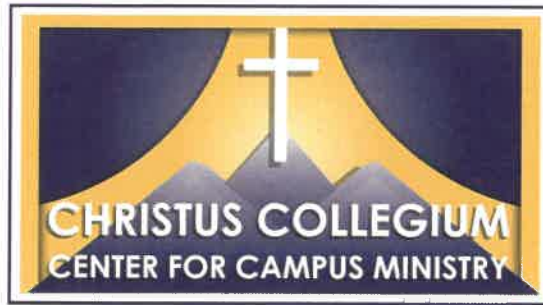
**4) Presentation of Internal Financial Inspection**

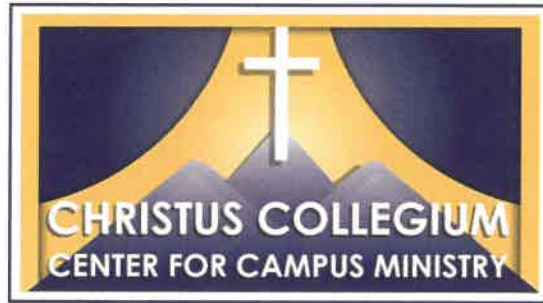

## Background & Current Operations

The building, known as the Christus Collegium or the Campus Christian Center, was built in 1965 as a Christian outpost to serve the students of Montana State University. The United Methodist denomination originally owned the building, and in 1979, the Center broadened the ownership to include the Lutherans, Episcopalians, and Presbyterians. All of these entities combined to form a new non-profit ecumenical association of campus ministries. The Presbyterians opted to discontinue their ownership in 2013. The building has since maintained its ecumenical ownership of Methodist, Lutheran and Episcopal denominations.

Today two separate but related ministries continue to operate out of the center as a Christian outpost. Those ministries are the United Methodist Campus Ministry and Lutheran Campus Ministry. Aside from these organizations, there are ongoing Bible studies, dinner fellowship, musical performances, recitals, self-help support groups, and many other university and community groups.

### ***2020, a year like no other...***

For over 50 years, the doors of the Christus Collegium were open to all in the spirit of Christian hospitality. However, 2020 saw the doors close for the first time in our history due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

With safety in mind, new social distancing guidelines and cleaning protocols were developed based on the recommendations from the CDC and Gallatin Valley Health Board. As the only space large enough to safely accommodate gatherings of more than a couple people, Wesley Hall became our saving grace. In September, we once again welcomed the campus ministries and small MSU and community groups to meet in person under the new COVID guidelines.

## **Christus Collegium Lutheran Campus Ministry Annual Report**

**March 17, 2021**

In spite of the COVID-19 pandemic during the MSU academic year, ministry forged ahead due, in large part, to accommodations in Wesley Hall. What once was thought of as a space too large and expansive for LCM students transformed into a vital and memorable meeting space. With an acceptable ventilation system, masked students sprawled out in camp chairs, granting LCM the opportunity to safely meet every week.

With a highly motivated leadership team and LCM students' desire for a place apart from MSU, LCM followed through with our regularly scheduled retreats, COVID-19 style. Open air conversations, poolside chats, campfire role plays, catered meals, separate lodging arrangements, additional drivers, and large seminar resort rooms punctuated the retreats. The 'ministry of daily life' fall theme highlighted loving all neighbors, respecting individual differences, and practicing the art of kindness. The Fairmont Spring Retreat was designed for personal reflection and focus upon "What is God Calling You to be?" by designing their own exclusive 'life sentence'.

Utilizing the Christus Collegium's sound system, Zoom platform, a new web cam, and the Methodist microphone system, the scheduled workshop events "Relationship Building" with Lyle Griner and "Transforming: The Bible and the Lives of Transgender Christians" with Austen Hartke were deemed a success; new students were in our midst and warmly welcomed at the Christus Collegium. Bible studies, COVID-19 campus outreach, and a Sunday evening book study of "How to Be an Anti-Racist" by Ibram Kendi continue faithfully. During Lent, a Great Falls MSU alumnus proclaims the Gospel of Luke on Zoom. The students produced a Zoom Worship service for the MT Synod churches for their usage during the pandemic.

semester, I'm thankful to Kerri Brown for her interim leadership at the CC. I truly appreciate my colleague Ann Dickensheets as we minister together and applaud Lisa McAlpin's persistence and patience as weekly improvements at the CC regularly occur under her tutelage.

Finally, I want to sincerely thank the Board of Directors for allowing LCM to meet during the COVID-19 pandemic. As always, let us give thanks to God for ministry opportunities; ministry begets ministry! Thank you for the privilege to partner with you; it is indeed a joy and privilege to serve among you. ## **CAMPUS AND YOUNG ADULT MINISTRY 2020: *The Covid Year***

**A YEAR OF CHANGE:** The first months of 2020 began like all other years: TNT began on January 16, and the following weekend we held our winter

retreat at Fairmont Hot Springs. The Cuba mission team was busy with fundraising, hosting a Krispy Kreme donut sale, a specialty coffee bar each Sunday after church, and a Cuban dinner and Salsa Dance lessons. And then, the world changed. Just days before our scheduled departure for Cuba, the university cancelled all club international travel and sent the students home for spring break, with instructions to stay home and finish their coursework online.

During this chaotic time, we cancelled plane tickets and the Cuban mission trip, bought face masks and hand sanitizer, and installed Zoom on our computers. We continued our weekly TNT meetings via Zoom and to our surprise, most of our students attended every meeting. We shared highs and lows, played games, shared important conversations and even experimented with an online painting lesson. The students were starved for connection with their MSU community, and we were blessed to spend time with them. In the spring we had an average of 15 students in attendance.

In the fall Cataplooza was cancelled, but with contacts through Abbie, BUMC youth attending MSU, and our regular TNT students bringing friends, we added a half a dozen new faces. We made the decision to meet in person, following new Covid safety protocols. We met outside for the first month of the semester, wearing our masks, and staying socially distanced. In addition, when we moved inside, we sanitized surfaces before and after the meetings, opened windows and turned on the ventilating fan, to keep fresh air moving. In the fall we had an average attendance of 16 students.

**STAFF LEADERSHIP:** Our TNT programs were led in the spring by Alison Skillman, Zak Wangler and Allie Zanarie-Hale. In the fall Abbie Thompson became our new program leader. Ann Dickensheets continues to coordinate the program.





**STUDENT LEADERSHIP TEAM:** Sarah Kisthart and Corinne Moss were our student interns in the spring. Maddie Raleigh replaced Corinne in the fall. The students manage the web page and Facebook page, run the weekly Bible study, work with the student activity office for poster distribution, attend MSU Fridays and student activity fairs, and create TNT social events.

**FUNDRAISER:** The spring fundraiser was cancelled due to the pandemic. The fall rummage sale, however, was a smashing success! With Covid safety in mind, we collected donations, held the sale and cleaned up, all in one day, on the lawn of the Christus Collegium. We raised almost \$4,000.

Originally built as a Faith and Life community for 40 students, the Christus Collegium now serves as a residential community for up to 18 residents.

Students from our participating denominations are given first priority for available rooms. We also extend our hospitality to international students, creating a unique interfaith, international community that provides opportunities for cross-cultural friendships and understanding. Currently, we house students from nine different countries.

Christus Collegium provides a safe, accepting 'home away from home' environment for these students to thrive. This was particularly critical during the past year when many international students opted to not return home due to the pandemic.

On-site coin operated laundry, wireless internet, off-street parking, and other utilities are included in the monthly rent of \$385 - providing safe, convenient, and affordable housing to MSU students.

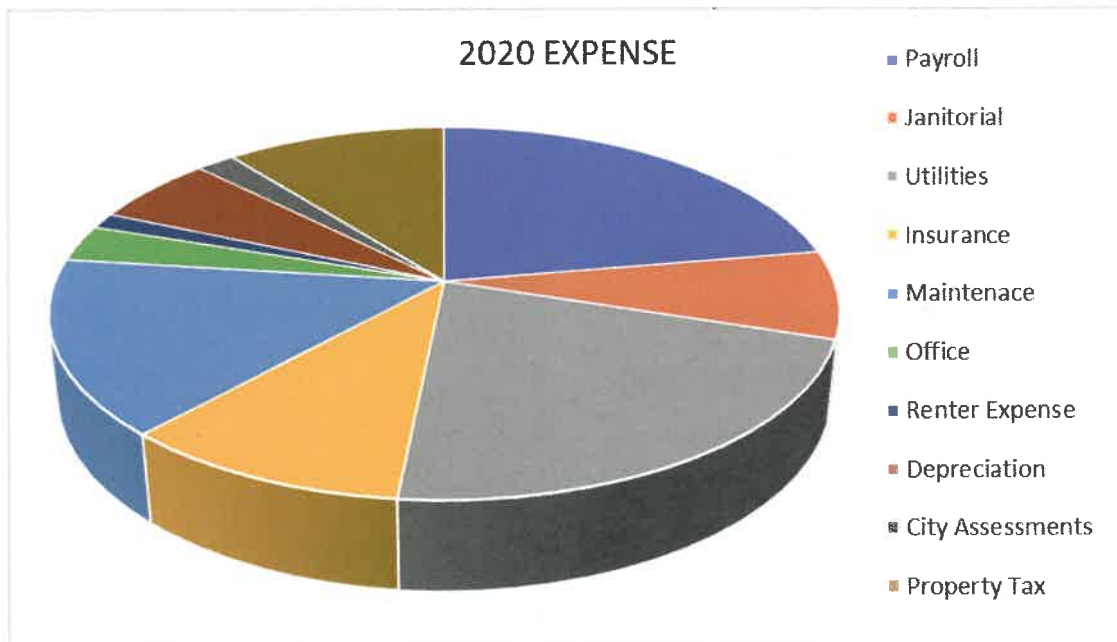
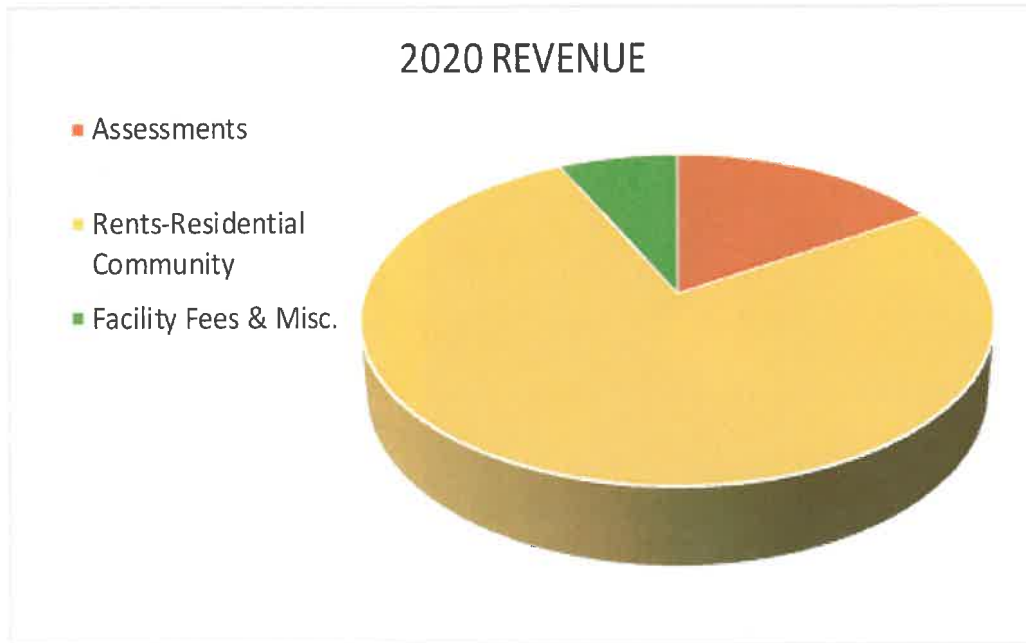
## RESIDENTIAL COMMUNITY MISSION STATEMENT

On the basis of your stated purposes and the understanding that your operations will continue as evidenced to date or will conform to those proposed in your ruling application, we have concluded that you are exempt from Federal income tax as an organization described in section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Any changes in operation from those described, or in your character or purposes, must be reported immediately to your District Director for consideration of their effect upon your exempt status. You must also report any change in your name or address.

You are not required to file Federal income tax returns so long as you retain an exempt status, unless you are subject to the tax on unrelated business income imposed by section 511 of the Code, in which event you are required to file Form 990-T. Our determination as to your liability for filing the annual information return, Form 990-A, is set forth above. That return, if required, must be filed on or before the 15th day of the fifth month after the close of your annual accounting period indicated above.

Contributions made to you are deductible by donors as provided in section 170 of the Code. Bequests, legacies, devises, transfers or gifts to or for your use are deductible for Federal estate and gift tax purposes under the provisions of section 2055, 2106 and 2522 of the Code.

You are not liable for the taxes imposed under the Federal Insurance Contributions Act (social security taxes) unless you file a waiver of exemption certificate as provided in such act. You are not liable for the tax imposed under the Federal Unemployment Tax Act. Inquiries about the waiver of exemption certificate for social security taxes should be addressed to this office, as should any questions concerning excise, employment or other Federal taxes.

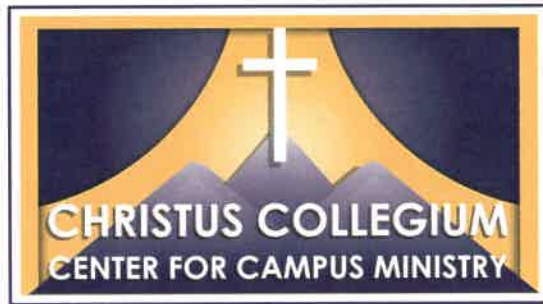
